- A reenergized Adult Sunday School group (8-15 people strong).

- A curious, and even inspired congregation taking on the Beatitudes with contemplation.
- A consistent team of shepherds reaching out to members and new comers alike.
- A whole host of hosts for fellowship, offering unbounded hospitality.
- A vibrant team of teachers caring for the young people in the church.

And finally, a fully engaged cohort of leaders and lovers of SteviUMC who participate in the Town Hall meetings, the intense work of naming and claiming who we are, and living the values that we already possess even while aspiring to live them out in robust ways in the future. This is the work making meaning for our lives- my definition of spirituality and a role of faith communities.

For instance, in February we considered our vision statement and began to envision what such attributes could look like. The phrase radical love became a point of pride for many, a statement to which many could say, "Yes! We are that and I want more of it!" Over the coming months, we will consider these phrases in a way that might identify us.

Ash Wednesday Open House February 26,2020 6:00-6:30pm


Come, reflect and receive imposition of ashes anytime during the open house in the sanctuary.





Genesis House

First opened 45 years ago, Genesis House is a transitional home for women with mental illness who are working their way toward living independently. Eight women live at the house, always with at least one staff member present. The women usually are referred to Genesis House by Warm Springs State Hospital or Providence Center.

The program director is Donna Thompson. With her staff, she helps the women learn how to manage a home, including its meals and budget. The women take turns cooking, shopping, and doing household chores like laundry and housekeeping.

They are sometimes visible in the community when they are shopping or walking in town. One or more of them often come to Sunday services at SUMC. The women also participate in the programs of Western Montana Mental Health. They spend time four days a week in Missoula at a day treatment center.

SUMC Trustees Report Highlights- January 2020

The Mountain Sky Conference has each church under a similar property insurance. The provider is Church Mutual, our current provider, but there have been changes. The conference has assigned three tiers and have put us in Tier 2. Our annual premium has increased from \$5041.00 to \$5557.60. We are investigating if our church can be re-categorized as a Tier 1 congregation to lower the premiums.

Trustees have determined that at approximately 30 years old it would be wiser to replace it rather than take a chance on a new circuit board that may or may not fix the problem. As of January 17 the new furnace has been installed.

We have assigned areas of responsibility to members of the Trustees Committee as follows:

- A. Church building (not kitchen & bathrooms) Paul Ludington, Ben Longbottom, John Fisher.
- B. Church building kitchen and bathrooms—Dave McGarvey, John Fisher.
- C. Landscaping and grounds (except lawn)—Ben Longbottom, John Fisher.
- D. Parsonage– John Soper, John Fisher.

Spring clean-up is scheduled for April 4 (weather permitting) with a back up date of April 25.

We spent considerable time discussing the maintenance needs of the church and parsonage and determined whether it is immediate, short to medium, or long-term needs and wishes. This is a first pass attempt and will be refined as we address maintenance issues. We will have a "Paint the Parsonage Party". Another immediate need is a front storm door. We have identified other intermediate to longer term needs to include new windows and new kitchen cabinets. With each project we will seek to make the home more accessible. For the church, immediate needs include a patch on the roof over the rear entry as well as seal coating the parking lots. Intermediate to longer term needs include fixing the nursery entry door and fire escape, exterior paint, and improvements to the sanctuary. These are just a few of the items identified by the trustees and the list will change as projects are completed, need arises, and other ideas are explored.

As the potential for greater use of the church building increases, the trustees will be reviewing and updating the current Building Use Policy and Fees. Please reach out if you have any questions.

Each woman lives at Genesis House for one to several years, until she has graduated from the program and is ready to move on.

Genesis House was founded by a group of local women who were interested in the problems of mental illness. One of the founders is still on the volunteer board. Over the years, the capacity of the house has doubled, and many improvements to the century-old building have made it a comfortable and pleasant place to live. Its mortgage was long since paid by community members and friends.

Because the Genesis House budget is always tight, in the annual Thank Offering, SUMC contributes to the mission of helping mentally ill women to recover. UMW also makes an annual donation. On any Sunday after church, a smile and a "good morning" to someone unknown may be a friendly greeting to one of the Genesis House women.
