Pastoral Pondering: The Courage of Love, Lament, and Hope

MATTHEW 5:3

"Blessed are those who are poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of God." (tr. New International Version)
"Blessed are those who know their need, for theirs is the grace of heaven." (tr. John Phillip Newell)

I have been reveling in and holding tightly to the recent words of Dr. Vivek Murthy about love as a strength which he spoke to in an interview with Krista Tippett with On Being and an essay entitled "Letter to a Young Activist During Troubled Times" by Dr. Clarissa Pinkola Estés which speaks to a robust and grounded love that guides. Both of these deep thinkers and prophets of our time have the ability and even courage to name how things are. Surgeon General Vivek Murthy speaks to loneliness as a public health crisis, a truth that he sees born out in the conversations he has with people all over the United States and the statistics brought forth from research and doctors visits. Dr. Estes acknowledges fear and uncertainty, a lament that has no answer or certainty but still anguish, helplessness and deep longing.

These voices and their sense of how it affects us individually and collectively as a society and community echo the cries of the ancient prophets- those who weep over the people's distraction or purposeful neglect of what is good and whole; those who cry out that justice and mercy and humble footsteps after God be the way for all people and societies; those who long for water to run down in abundance, not just to flood the land as it washes over a parched ground, but be absorbed for nourishment, new growth, and healing.

It's possible to say that now more than ever before we need that awareness spoken with clarity and truthfulness. Such awareness beckons from within a mutual awareness that may evoke lament, desperation, grief, and heartache that we will often rush through for sunshine and ease and joy. Is it possible to sit for a moment and be in the discomfort, even despair? Maybe you try the practice of crafting your own lament by reading Psalm 42 and writing your own version of its cries and longings as you would name them in your own metaphors and images... This is an invitation to your soul.

It's also possible to say that there is no time like now to recognize the hope and calling for courage to step into the tragic gap of our longings and realities with a kind word, stance of curiosity, a willingness to engage where it has felt fraught.

Dr. Murthy and Dr. Estés evoke a hope that such small acts not only work and are possible, but they can happen by and through anyone: today in a 15-minute conversation or an attention offered without distraction of a device. The hope finds substance/essence in love, deep wisdom, courageous showing up, and listening with trust to the inner teacher of yourself and the one you're with. A certain compassion is possible when lament is acknowledged and cared for and hope through faith lifts your eyes. That compassion might look like a spark of love that encourages another one to shine. The compassion might give you permission to be a floating lantern that ventures out into the unpredictable waters where it trusts other "able souls" to meet and join the effort of lighting a new or uncharted way.

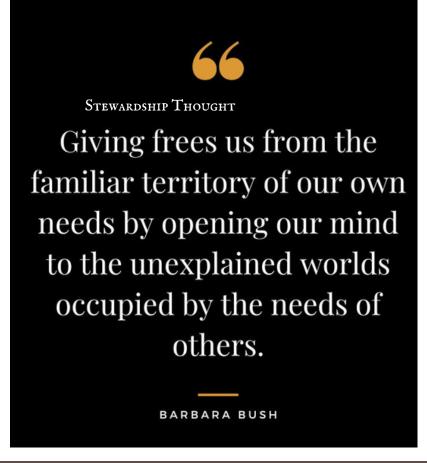

Summer Worship

Two services June 11- July 23, 9am & 10:30

Beginning June 11, worship opportunities will encompass the outdoors and indoors, the contemplative and the traditional, the early and the later. All are welcome to encounter God when and where fits your soul. Child care will be available at both times inside, though young people are welcome to chalk color or swing while others worship outside. Please bring a lawn chair for the 9am service.

The 9am service will be a meditative gathering that includes songs, prayer, scripture and a "Third Thing." This third thing- a song, writing, image, short mediation, or scripture- will invite a focus of thought and reflection that can be quiet enough for the shy soul to emerge and speak its deep wisdom. Some days we will receive the "Third Thing" and reflect in silence or writing for several minutes. Other times we will be invited (not a share or die moment) to share with one or two other people what emerges. The message for the morning will embrace the wisdom within you as much as any shared by the pastor, prayers or music offered out loud.

The 10:30 service will look similar to the current worship expressions with children's time, sermon, congregational songs and prayer. Similar themes will cross over from the 9am service to 10:30. In June we will conclude our series: Resurrection Unbounded: Reclaiming the Thrown Away. In July we will explore Jesus' two commandments: Love the Lord with all your heart, mind, body and soul and Love your neighbors as yourself. Songs from musicals, operas, or anthems will ring forth as a guiding expression toward oneness with God.

- July 30 will be one service OUTSIDE at 10:30 with a community Potluck Picnic following a celebratory worship highlighting Vacation Bible School: The Tree of Healing.









With All You Are, Love God and Neighbor Worship Series Tune 11-July 30

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." ~ Mark 12:30-31

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, Jesus Christ urged all who follow him and want to live his teachings to do so with two simple commands to guide the Way: Love God. Love your neighbor. They are simple because they are straight forward without a hidden agenda. But many would say they are not easy. Even during his lifetime, people asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" (Do I really have to love everyone or just the neighbors I like or that agree with me.) Likewise, how does one love with ALL our heart, mind, soul and strength? Uncovering the depth of Jesus' call and modes by which followers can live into this call can encourage individual and communal fidelity to the act of Love.

In this two-month series, we will unpack these two commandments through the arts- music, movies, and musical theatre. Likewise, this series invites us to live out the commandments in life together in Bible Study, fellowship at Summer Concerts, contemplative practices, shared excursions of discovery and fun, and service particularly with Vacation Bible School.

June 11: "With All Your Mind"

Science, spiritual practices and our own bodies can remind us over and over again that we can only do one thing at a time. Multitasking usually diminishes the effort and product. Likewise, it leaves our brains overly tired and less satisfied. When Jesus called his disciples to follow him, he not only wanted their physical bodies to walk alongside him, he wanted their minds to be unencumbered, undistracted by all the other claims that could grab their attention and devotion. What do we gain with a mind only focused on God, what God loves, and how God calls us to follow such ways? How are communities and relationships enhanced with this single-mindedness? Let us explore how we might love God "with all our mind" through the traditions of artists and poets.

SCRIPTURE: MATTHEW 9:9-13, 18-26

June 18: "With All Your Strength"

Strength manifests itself most obviously in the body- the fortitude, endurance and might that dictate every move. Likewise, the absence of this strength can feel and result in very real changes in daily routine. This strength and weakness exist in how we enact our character and live out choices. And here, according to Jesus and the Apostle Paul, sometimes that which seems weak or vulnerable is the strongest. Paul experienced many afflictions from person health and societal disapproval that could have left him "weak," but God assured him, through it all, God's strength flowed through him. When we offer all our strength, how does God get to flow through our body, behaviors and choices, even and especially when others might judge those actions as wrong or "weak" in character or effort? Through the music of Ragtime: The Musical sung by Arielle Nachtigall, we'll explore this call to "love with all your strength."

June 25: "With All Your Heart"

Pentecost is part of our spirit still even if it's not the day of new reckoning. In fact, during the seemingly hum-drum days of hot summer or regular routine, we might stop short to say- is this really what life is about? Is this my purpose? How are my thoughts helping or distracting me in the ways I am meant to live? As we explore what it means to "love God with all your heart," we come to listen to our personality and how it uniquely loves God. Summer is a great time for books and movies, and our illustration for this week can inspire both spiritual reflection as well as new idea for reading. John Irving's book A Prayer for Owen Meany and the movie adaptation called "Simon Birch" will offer guidance in the journey of claiming our purpose in spite of stubbornness or doubt.

July 2: "With All Your Soul"

Oh the soul! It can seem like a rascal that is full of passion and longing. And yet, to attend to it, to hear it, to even know its presence, the soul needs quiet, still, gentle and safe invitation. Parker Palmer describes the soul as a "wild animal," easily spooked. It is this very space, quality and voice within us that is the closest to the infinite essence of God. The Psalmist writes, "the deep cries out to deep." How can we let our soul speak and God's very desire planted within us to take shape in daily life, the distractions and delicacies mixed together? Cheyenne Brown will illuminate some beauty and subtly by singing "My Feet May Take a Little While" by Errollyn Wallen.

Greeters & Liturgists

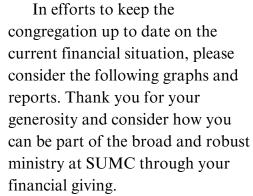

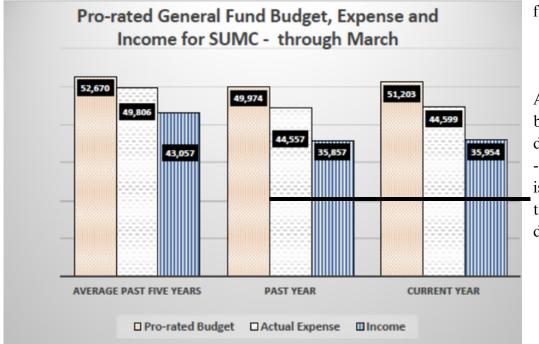

We had a better giving month in April but still fell behind expenses by \$2300. This brings our total deficit in the general fund to -\$8655. As the graphs indicate, this is consistent with where we were at this point last year and is above the deficit average of the last five years.

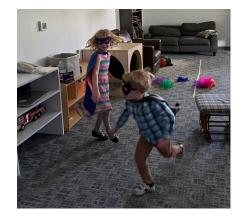

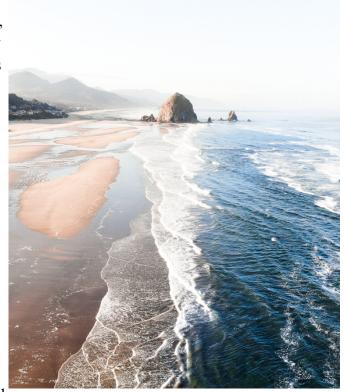
Some have asked what is in store for this time.
